8. NEW BREEDS

8.1 RECOGNITION OF ASIAN TABBY BREED

Moved by QFA

- a) That ACF recognise the Asian Shorthair in the Ticked Tabby pattern which is currently recognised by the QFA as the Asian' breed.
- b) That ACF recognise the Asian Shorthair as a standalone breed as it has done with both the Burmilla and Mandalay breeds.
- c) That ACF recognises the Asian Shorthair in the colours of Brown, Blue, Chocolate, Lilac, Red, Cream and Tortoiseshell.
- d) That ACF accepts the attached) breed standard as is currently adapted by QFA Inc'.
- e) That ACF accepts that the Asian Shorthair is only eligible for champion status when it is fourth generation or full register'.
- f) That ACF accepts that the only allowable breeding partners of the Asian Shorthair are the Asian Shorthair and Burmese'.

8.2 RECOGNITION OF MUNCHKIN BREED

Moved by QICC

ACF fully recognises the Munchkin breed for breeding and showing.

8.3 RECOGNITION OF THE NEBELUNG BREED

Moved by COAWA

- 1) ACF accepts the Nebelung Cat for full recognition based on the GCCF UK standard in both Longhair and Shorthair.
- 2) The Nebelung Shorthair variants to be shown in its own individual classes, and not to be confused with or added to the Russian Blue classes.
- 3) Nebelung Shorthair is not to be used in a Russian breeding programme
- 4) All shorthair Nebelung kittens not to be retained for a Nebelung breeding programme are to be desexed before homing as pets.”

9 CORRESPONDENCE AND SUBMISSIONS – BY-LAWS

9.1 BYLAW PART 1 – CRITERIA FOR RECOGNITION OF NEW ACF OR CCCA STATE REGISTERING BODIES

Moved by CATSWA

Actual wording of motion as it is to be put to the meeting:

“that the ACF By Laws be updated as follows:

1.3 RECOGNISED GOVERNING / CONTROLLING BODIES WITHIN AUSTRALIA

A. Definition of Recognised bodies

- a) ACF means the Australian Cat Federation (Inc).
- b) CCCA means the Co-ordinating Cat Council of Australia Inc. Currently (June 2019) recognised affiliate bodies for CCCA are Cats Qld, CFA NSW, FCCV, FASA, Capitol Cats ACT, CCC Tasmania
- c) Other Australian Governing Body means a governing/registering body other than CCCA or ACF.
- d) Provisional ACF member means a registration body accepted for affiliation by the ACF at an Annual General Meeting that has not been operating for 12 months. A provisional member will not have voting rights for 12 months until it may become a full member body
- e) Full ACF Member means a state registration body that has met all the criteria in Clause 1.5
- f) Provisional CCCA member means a new registration body recognised by CCCA as an associate member that has not been operating for 12 months but has met the criteria in 1.6
- g) ACF recognised CCCA member means a CCCA state registration body that is listed in 1.3A b) and/or met the criteria in 1.6
- h) A breakaway group is an associate CCCA Member that has not met the criteria in 1.6, or a group that is operating as a pedigree cat registration body, but not affiliated with ACF, CCCA nor AN Cats

B a) Judges licensed by any Other Australian Governing Body may not be appointed to officiate in any capacity at Shows conducted by ACF or an ACF member body.

b) Awards made by judges licensed by any Other Australian Governing Body will not be recognised.

1.4 Within Australia, ACF and its member bodies recognise the registrations, awards and judges of state registration bodies which are affiliated with ACF as provisional or full members.

Within Australia, ACF Inc and its member bodies recognise the registrations, awards and Judges of the above listed Cat Organisations which are affiliated with CCCA Inc

a) Provisional ACF Member bodies may exhibit at ACF National Shows, on provision of registration and pedigree papers to the show secretary

b) ACF Judges may accept assignments from Provisional ACF Member bodies..

c) Provisional ACF Members registrations will be subject to verification by existing ACF member bodies, and should show at least 5 generation pedigree or more if stipulated in the ACF Registration Rules for the breed

1.5 Acceptance of new ACF Member bodies.

Registration bodies, whether already operating, or newly established need to meet the following criteria to be accepted as an ACF Member Body in accordance with protocol outlined in ACF Constitution Clause 6.

- Been in operation as an incorporated organisation in the state of origin for at least six (6) months prior to application to ACF for affiliation
- Have a membership of at least 30 full members, actively participating by registration of pet or pedigree cats, prior to application
- Have a registration data base aligned to ACF and be able to demonstrate to ACF that such standards are being adhered to
- Have at least one ACF or previously CCCA accredited National All Breeds judge.
- Have published in a public domain their Constitution, Show Rules, Breeding Rules and Codes of Ethics
- If applicable, have provided an explanation as to why the establishment of a new registration body is preferable to resolving perceived issues within an existing state registration body.

1.6 Recognition by ACF of new CCCA member bodies, including registrations, judges and awards will only be given on specific recommendation from CCCA accompanied with written documentation demonstrating proof of the criteria listed below. Such new member body will be considered by ACF as a provisional CCCA Member for 12 months, after provision by CCCA to ACF of written proof of its eligibility

- Been in operation as an incorporated organisation in the state of origin for at least six (6) months prior to application to CCCA for affiliation
- Have a membership of at least 30 full members, actively participating with registration of pet or pedigree cats, prior to application
- Have a registration data base aligned to CCCA able to demonstrate to CCCA and ACF that such standards are being adhered to

- Have at least one ACF or CCCA accredited National All Breeds judge.
- Have published in a public domain their Constitution, Show Rules, Breeding Rules and Codes of Ethics

- If applicable, have provided an explanation as to why the establishment of a new registration group was preferable to resolving perceived issues within an existing state registration body.

a) ACF will not recognise CCCA member bodies that have not met the above conditions and such member bodies will initially be considered breakaway groups.

b) Breakaway groups receiving CCCA recognition as associate member will not be recognised by ACF until the above conditions are met. This will mean that ACF and its Member Bodies will not recognise their registrations (unless such registration details are verified by ACF member body records), nor their judges and awards and their members will not be eligible to enter an ACF National Show.

c) Provisional CCCA Members will be permitted to enter ACF National Shows

d) Registration and pedigree records from provisional CCCA members would need to be verified by ACF or ACF recognised CCCA member body records for at least 5 generations or more if stipulated in ACF Registration Rules for the breed

e) ACF judges are permitted to judge for provisional CCCA members.

f) ACF judges are not permitted to judge for Breakaway groups

1.7 a) ACF member bodies may recognise the registrations and pedigrees of Cat Organisations which are affiliated with ACF, CCCA or their member bodies as well as ANCATS registered cats which can be verified by the data recorded in their own, or other ACF or recognised CCCA Inc member bodies' registers, if the breeding of such cats is within ACF Breeding Rules. Such pedigrees and registration records should be for at least 5 generations, or more if stipulated in ACF Registration Rules for the breed

b) The progeny of cats which have been imported into the ANCATS register from overseas be accepted on verification to the satisfaction of a member body of the parents' export certified pedigrees and that the breeding of such cats is within the ACF Inc. Breeding Rules.

c) That cats which comply with subparagraphs (a) and/or (b) above may be shown in ACF member body's shows, provided they are not a breakaway group

d) ACF and its affiliates recognise the awards and Judges of recognised International Cat Organisations with the exception of judges licensed by any Other Australian Governing Body or a breakaway group

1.8 No group that has been expelled from either ACF or CCCA will be considered for acceptance as an affiliate of ACF, or a recognised registration body, unless a minimum of 5 years has elapsed since expulsion. Such applications will be considered on a case by case basis.

9.2 BYLAWS PART 1 – RECOGNITION OF CATS UNITED WA AS A CCCA PROVISIONAL MEMBER

Moved by CATSWA

that Cats United WA be given recognition as a provisional CCCA Member by ACF (under the proposed new By Laws) effective from 11 June 2019, provided CCCA has demonstrated by a response in writing to ACF questions as to how CUWA matches CCCA criteria for recognition in accordance with their own Constitution, or meets ACF new pre-requisites..

9.3 RECOGNITION OF AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CATS INC

Moved by CATSWA

that effective from endorsement of ACF AGM 11 June 2019 decisions, that the ACF recognises Australian National Cats Inc

9.4. BYLAWS PART 2 – BREEDING AND REGISTRATION RULES – COMBINATION OF STRUCTURAL MUTATIONS

Moved by CAT

That ACF Inc will not at any stage recognise any breed which results from more than one structural mutation.

9.5 RECOGNITION OF ROAN COLOURATION KNOWN AS KARPATI IN PEDIGREE CATS

Moved CANT

that The ACF (In.) recognise the roan colour in cats known as karpati, specifically in La Perm and breeds where the allowable outcross is the domestic cat.

9.6 CLARIFICATION OF RULES 8.11 and 9.13 FOR JUDGING EXPERIMENTAL KITTENS

Moved by GCCFV

Add extra words to Experimental Breeding Rule 8.11 and Registration of Experimental Cats Rule 9.13 describing how experimental kittens are to be judged.

**9.7 Clarification for assessing new and developing breeds/varieties and showing variant kittens as part of a complete litter in litter classes
Moved by GCCFV**

Motion 1 “that a Rule for assessing new and developing breeds/varieties be added to the ACF Inc Breeding and Registration Rules”

Motion 2 “that a Rule for allowing Variant kittens from Experimentally bred cats to be shown as part of a complete litter in litter classes be added to the ACF Inc Breeding and Registration Rules”

Motion 3 “that a Rule for allowing Variant kittens from Allowable outcross breeds to be shown as part of a complete litter in litter classes be added to the ACF Inc Breeding and Registration Rules”

Motion 4 “that a Rule for allowing Variant kittens from Established breeds to be shown as part of a complete litter in litter classes be added to the ACF Inc Breeding and Registration Rules.

**9.8 Clarification of British Shorthair Rule 13.5.8.5 Parts c, d and e
Moved by GCCFV**

Add extra words to British Shorthair Rule 13.5.8.5 Part c (Motion 1), Part d (Motion 2) and Part e (Motion 3) to assist Member bodies, Registrars and Breeders with understanding and implementing these Parts of Rule 13.5.8.5 that were approved by ACF (Inc.) member bodies in 2018.

Motion 1:

Rule 13.5.8.5

Part (c) No imported cat should be registered as a full generation British Shorthair if they have breeds other than the accepted outcrosses within the last 8 generations in their pedigree. ACF (Inc.) Member bodies may register imported British Shorthair cats that have non-accepted outcross breeds in their 8-generation pedigree, in an approved Experimental Breeding program for British Shorthair.

Motion 2:

Part (d) Where a British Shorthair is allowed as an outcross for another breed the progeny will not be recognised as a British Shorthair. ACF (Inc.) Member bodies may register outcross progeny who display British Shorthair phenotype, in an approved Experimental Breeding program for British Shorthair.

Motion 3:

Rule 13.5.8.5

Part (e) Where another breed has been used in a British Shorthair mating is under an approved Experimental Breeding Program for any breed including British Shorthair, the progeny of such a mating will be identified with the EMS code to identify the non-British Shorthair breed genotype after the registration number ad infinitum.

9.9 British Shorthair – 8 Generation Pedigrees

Moved by FCCQ

Part A - Amend By-laws Part 2 Clause 13.5.8.5. Note c) to read

- c) “that No imported cat should be registered as a British Shorthair if they have breeds other than the ACF accepted outcrosses within the last **8 Five (5)** generations in their pedigree.

Part B – That by-laws Part 2 Clause 13.5.8.5. Note e) **be deleted**

~~Where another breed has been used in a British mating under an approved Experimental Breeding Program, the progeny of such a mating will be identified with the EMS breed code to identify the breed after the registration number ad infinitum.~~

If Part B is lost then we propose Part C – that the rules for experimental programs be amended to read that all other breeds used in any experimental programme will be identified with the EMS breed code to identify the breed after the registration number ad infinitum.

- ACF currently recognise cats within experimental programs after 4 generations as being full register cats. (By-laws Part Two 5.1)
- The phenotype is the physical expression, or characteristics, of that trait, therefore after the 4 generations, in line with ACF current rules on experimentation that British Shorthair to Selkirk Rex (for example) would be full register after 4 generations of British to British and considered a British Shorthair, therefore there would be no requirement for breeds used and EMS codes attached to registration numbers ad infinitum.
- If by-laws Part 2 Clause 13.5.8.5. Note e) is not deleted then the requirement to have EMS codes included in the registration number ad infinitum should apply to all breeds used in any experimental breeding programme and not single out any one breed.

It should be recognised that recent registration bodies, for example those in China would not have access to 8 generations of pedigree data.

9.10 BYLAWS PART 3 – AMEND ACF COMPANION STANDARD

Moved by FCCQ

that the Revised companion Pet standard replace the current standard

In the past there has been discussion on accepting or not in the companion Pet class any cat with physical defects such as missing ears, blind cats, three legged cats etc. The Current ACF standard does not address this issue and as TICA has a comprehensive Household Pet standard much of it has been added to the ACF standard as the TICA general description and standard does address the issue of less than physically perfect Companion Pet cats.

9.11 BENGAL – RECOGNITION OF CHARCOAL COLOUR/PATTERN

Moved By CANT

that The ACF (In.) recognise the charcoal colour/pattern in Bengal cats

9.12 UPDATE TO LYKOI BOTH BREEDING AND SHOWING

Moved by CVI

The ACF affiliated Lykoi breeders present to the ACF the progress and compliance to the directions from ACF GM 2017 Item 9.11 and ACF Judges Guild 6.5 minutes.

As there is only one breeder of Lykoi in an ACF affiliate, monitoring of this breed's progress needs to occur so to ensure compliance with not only the affiliates rules but ACF's rules and standards to safeguard the survival of the breed in Australia and ACF's reputation

9.13 BREED STANDARDS – LYKOI- AMEND REMARKS

Moved by CVI

That : a) Add to the General description last sentence – “The Lykoi is a balanced medium sized cat that is very friendly and demands attention from people.”

b) Add to Head description – “Medium modified wedge with..”

c) Add to Body description – d) “Medium Foreign type..”

9.14 BREED STANDARD OCICAT - Amendment of the ACF Inc Breeding and Registration Rules and Ocicat standard to allow Classic Ocicats to be shown in Assessment classes and kittens to be shown as part of a complete litter in litter classes

Moved by GCCFV

that the Rules for Ocicat be amended to read: -

13.5.24. Ocicat

13.5.24.1.

Tabby coat pattern (Spotted only) (Black, Blue, Chocolate, Lilac, Cinnamon & Fawn only plus Silver equivalents)

Note:

a) Allowable outcross Abyssinian (including Silver), for kittens born before 31/12/2030.

b) Cats with a Classic Tabby pattern are classed as Any Other Variety: They

i) cannot be awarded a challenge (*ie adults can only be shown in Assessment classes*); but

ii) can be used in breeding programs

iii) *kittens can be shown in Assessment classes and as part of a complete litter in litter classes*

9.15 Snowshoe – changes to Standard, Breeding and Registration rules Moved by GCCFV

That the following changes (*shown in italics*) be made to the Snowshoe Breed standard, Breeding and Registration rules

- a) **Motion 1:** Remarks – to add the wording: *“Cats that display a white Inverted “V” on their face with limited amounts of white on their paws, back legs, chin and chest should be judged in the Bicolour class”*.
- b) **Motion 2:** *Colourpoint and cats with excessive White or Van pattern – to be registered as AOV*
- c) **Motion 3:** Allowable outcross – change current wording from “none” to *“Siamese and suitable domestic within an approved experimental breeding program”*.

9.16. Recognition of allowable outcrosses be added to the Sphynx Standard Moved by QICC

ACF includes the allowable outcrosses of American Shorthair and Devon Rex to the Sphynx Standard

Including the allowable outcrosses as per the TICA standard, American Shorthair and Devon Rex, will allow a wider gene pool accessible to the Sphynx breed and as a result will improve the overall health of the breed and decrease the occurrence of HCM.

9.17. BYLAWS PART 4 – JUDGES TRAINING SCHEME -Additions to the ACF Judges Training Scheme Moved by GCCFV

that

- a) time frames be added to the returning of marked exam papers to the trainees.
 - b) Judge Emeritus and its definition be added to the list of categories of judges.
- a) There needs to be a time frame set for trainee judges to have access to their marked papers and for these papers to be lodged with the Member Body.
- b) The title Judge Emeritus may be used by some ACF Member associations eg GCCFV for ‘retired’ Judges. Although this title is only used at the Member Body level, it needs to be defined in the ACF Judges Training Scheme categories of Judges to cover Emeritus Judges who are appointed by their Member Bodies as Tutor Judges, so that their signature on JTS training forms can be accepted by ACF.

9.18 BYLAWS PART 5 – AWARDS – COMPANION AWARD OF HONOUR Moved by FCCQ

The requirements for the Companion Award of Honour be amended to read

- Awarded to the Best in Show
- For each level, applications must be accompanied by Ten (10) original award certificates and sent to the affiliate control.

The current rules are very restrictive and instead of being encouraging are in fact discouraging. There is no restriction on the number of entries for the pedigree group and in some states the Group Two numbers are extremely low, such as Queensland where at time there may only be one or two entered and they are still eligible for the ACF AoE and only require 10 awards whilst companion cats are required to get 15.

9.19 COMPANION AWARD OF HONOUR - Awarding of ACF Companion Award of Honour Certificates. Moved by QFA

Eligibility for Award

That Section 5.4.3 of the ACF By-Laws be amended to read:

Awarded to the Best Adult Companion in Show, where a minimum of three (3) adult companions are entered and where that cat is the highest placed adult companion in the Top Three (3) awards.'

Advancement to Next Level

That Section 5.4.8 of the ACF By-Laws be amended to read:

For each level, applications must be accompanied by ten (10) original award certificates and sent to the affiliate control.'

CCCA Registered Cats

That Section 5.4.12 of the ACF By-Laws be amended to read:

Application for AoH title for a cat registered with an affiliate of CCCA may be made as above, through the ACF affiliate control in the state of residence, or may be sent direct to the ACF Titles Registrar, on the appropriate form, with ten (10) original certificates and payment.'

There are sometimes less than five (5) adult companion cats at shows in Queensland which precludes the awarding of the Award of Honour Certificate. Reducing the threshold for eligibility of the award to three (3) adult companion cats in show will encourage exhibitors to continue to exhibit their cat and strive for the award.

Furthermore, kittens compete with adults for best in show awards and sometimes achieve best in show. The highest placed adult companion behind the kitten should be eligible for the Award of Honour Certificate as long as it is placed in the top three (3).

Given the low number of adult companion cats being shown, reducing the number of awards from 15 to 10 to achieve the next level may encourage exhibitors to continue to show their cats and even lead to greater numbers of companion exhibits. The reduction in the number of certificates is also consistent with pedigree cats which only require ten (10) awards for advancement to the next level

9.20 BYLAWS PART 6 – NATIONAL SHOWS - Resubmission 2018 Motion ACF National Vetting Procedure & Veterinary Inspection Rejection Notification Form Moved by FCCQ

1. ACF National Vetting procedure be added to the Policy and Procedures Manual and a reference added in By-laws Part 6.2 Show Rules part 17 b). which include an exhibitor who has travelled with the exhibitor whose exhibits have been rejected.
2. Add a new clause N. Vetting to ACF-Bylaws-Part 6.1- Show_Rules_Admin with the Veterinary Inspection Rejection Notification Form as an appendix

The current show rules state that a Veterinary Surgeon may reject an exhibitor's kitten or cat and if determined may reject all the exhibitor's entries.

17 b) The veterinary surgeon shall order any cat to be removed from the show if, in his/her opinion, it is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease or has external parasites. Their decision in this regard will be final. Should the veterinarian reject one of an exhibitor's cats or kittens, all the exhibitor's entries may be rejected.

Currently there is no procedure whereby the show committee, exhibitor or an exhibitor who has travelled with the exhibitor whose exhibits have also been rejected can follow and/or refer to the process which needs to be followed.

9.21 Diane Page Award Moved by CANT

Members recall that ACF (Inc.) instituted a Diane Page Memorial Trophy presented at the National Show from memory for Burmese, this continued for a number of years and we wondered why it was discontinued?

Draft Definition

"That a subject be determined to be confidential if it has potential legal ramifications against ACF or individual people or if it contains personal information and that it could place a person in a position where others can pursue them privately or on social media."

- Should all non-confidential issues be discussed with the relevant affiliate executive or management committee before replying.
- What time frames do we expect issues to be discussed.
- When are affiliate deputy committee persons involved and when are they not, given that they are constitutionally a member of the Committee of Management?

"The committee shall consist of - (a) the officers of the Federation with the exception of (c) Immediate Past President; and (b) an ordinary committeeperson and an elected deputy committeeperson of each affiliated body in such a way each member is represented with one vote per affiliate. "

- Define the roles of the Executive positions to include input from the President, Secretary Treasurer, and ILO in discussions of the Committee of Management.
- Where there is no definition of executive roles a definition be developed and current roles updated accordingly.

**11.4 Undesirable side effects from vaccination were Crandell Rees Feline Kidney (CRFK) Cell are used
Moved by CANT**

that the ACF (Inc.) lobby research groups into feline health such as the Feline Health Fund to investigate the excessive use of vaccination where Crandell Rees Feline Kidney (CRFK) Cells are involved and the perceived relationship to increased kidney disease in cats

There has been a disastrous growth in the incidence of kidney disease in cats especially pedigree cats over the years and it is speculated that some of this may be attributed to over-vaccination (encouraged by drug companies and veterinarians) for other than preventative health measures.
