b. WCC Meeting, plans for 2022.

FCCQ, Robbie Walker has contacted Penny Bydlinski to discuss the doubt that the 2022 WCC meeting scheduled for June in Brisbane in conjunction with the ACF National would proceed due to border restrictions and the uncertainty of COVID related lockdowns and border closures. A verbal discussion agreed that ACF could offer to host the 2023 meeting in conjunction with the National.

TFA is on the agenda to host 2023, Cats WA in 2024 & GCCFV in 2025, TFA had been approached and agreed willingly to ACF the hosting the meetings & seminars in conjunction with the 2023 National.

CAT (LM) suggested that Cats WA should be approached as they had been the original hosts in 2020, Carole Galli advised that their committee did not know how 2024 had been assigned to them and that they were not interested in hosting the ACF National in 2024.

### 8.1 ACF Constitution – Changes to Rules Annual General Meeting

116. The ordinary business of the annual general meeting shall be:

- a. to confirm the minutes of the last preceding annual general meeting.
- b. to receive reports from the Officers of the Federation, auditor's report upon the books and accounts for the last preceding financial year, member bodies and servants of the Federation upon the transactions of the Federation during the last preceding financial year.
- c. to elect the officers of the Federation and agree the ordinary committee persons.
- d. to appoint the auditor; and
- e. to determine the remuneration of Officers of the Federation; and  
**insert new clause**
- f. to determine changes to these Rules made by Special Resolution.

118. a. The annual general meeting may transact special business of which notice is given in accordance with these rules.

**insert new clause**

- b. Any changes to these Rules may only be made by Special Resolution at an Annual General Meeting.

### 8.3 ACF Constitution – Basic Objects – New Sub Clause 9 (m)

By Special Resolution

**Rule 9 of the Constitution be amended to add a new sub clause (m) under Basic Objects to read as follows:**

To champion the cat as a valuable addition to the lifestyle and wellbeing of many social groups in Australia. To interact with State, Territory and Federal Government entities as appropriate to educate policy and/or law makers in the values upheld by responsible members of the cat fancy and to actively oppose the inhumane treatment of cats perceived to be a problem.

Cats WA (CG) We just had a query about the resourcing of this, you cannot say that you must be a stakeholder, you must be invited to be a stakeholder. You cannot just dictate that you are going to be a stakeholder. Cats WA applaud the intent, but I do not know that it is going to work.

GCCFSA (FH) I would just echo what Carol said it was exactly what I was going to say and applaud the motion. But you must be invited to be a stakeholder. You cannot just say you are going to be one.

#### 8.4 ACF Constitution – Basic Objects – New Sub Clause (n)

By Special Resolution

**Rule 9 of the Constitution be amended to add a new sub clause (n) under Basic Objects to read as follows:**

To protect & promote the health, welfare, and to raise awareness on the responsible ownership of all cats, including the microchipping of all cats and the desexing of cats sold as pets. Our member offer education and advice to pet owners and the showing of neutered and spayed domestic cats.

#### 8.5 ACF Constitution – Notice of General Meeting

By Special Resolution

**Clause 128 of the constitution be amended to read:**

128. Notice of meetings the Secretary of the Federation shall, at least sixty (60) days before the date fixed for holding any meetings of the Federation, other than special general meetings, notify all member or provisional member bodies in writing specifying the place, day, and time for the holding of the meeting. Motions & proposals to be received by the Secretary of the Federation no later than forty (45) days prior to the date of the meeting. The agenda for the meeting and the business to be transacted thereat to be circulated no later than thirty (30) days before the date of the meeting.

Cats NSW, (DC) why have they taken out the word general, what would be the difference?

CANT., (SG) there are three types of meetings that have been listed, this amendment covers all meetings.

#### 8.6 ACF Constitution - Standardisation of Terminology used.

By Special Resolution

**the Constitution be amended to standardise terminology used and other corrections as shown in attached document.**

Briefly:

- Throughout the Constitution, amendments have been made so that in all places they are consistent with those that are defined in clause 1 Name and 2 Interpretation.
- In addition:
  - There are several places where grammar has been corrected eg. clauses 24, 35, 41c, 42, 45, & 176
  - Cl 74 b: has been corrected as a deputy committee person is not “elected” as such. They are a nomination from the member or provisional member body.
  - Cl 76 & 78, 87 & 88: removed references that ordinary committee and deputy committee persons are *elected* rather than *nominated by their member body*.
  - Cl 78 c: removed the term “Executive” as they are referred to as “Committee Officers or an officer of the Federation”.
  - Cl 89: Duties of office holders corrected grammar and included that requirement are for all meetings.
    - Cl 78, 111 removed references to *executive committee* as there is not one.
    - Cl 141 amended as approved in 2020.
    - Cl 142 delated as approved in 2020 so there will be consequential renumbering.
  - Cl 143: removed reference to *proxies* - there is no proxies, member bodies can provide, by notification, alternate persons to attend any meetings.

President (JJ) with respect to that solicitor her brief was limited to making sure that the constitution was correct in line with the West Australian legislation.

## 9. SUBMISSIONS - BY-LAWS CHANGES

### 9.1 ACF By-laws Part 2. Clause 4 New Sub Clause

**“that the ACF (Inc.) issue numbered Prefix Certificates on the clearance of Cattery Prefixes and a new clause 4.7 be added to By-laws Part 2 Clause 4**

4.7 On issuing a Prefix, ACF(Inc.) will issue a numbered national prefix Certificate. The issuing Member or Provisional Member Body may be included on the Certificate.

**Seconded:** Cats WA, Carole Galli

**CANT. (JS)** ACF has a national panel of judges, to have a national prefix bring more kudos than individual states some of which have 4 or 5 controls in them. It would be a positive tool in tackling the government when they're imposing severe legislation on the cat fancy, because we can say that our breeders are following the guidelines of ACF.

**GCCFSA (FH)** would ACF be issuing numbers retrospectively or is this from a certain date moving forward. Would member bodies have access to the database.

**CANT. (JS)** suggest we decide whether we want to do it or not in the first instance, and to then move forward. Then the historical side of it would be a work in progress.

More work to be done and perhaps bring it back later.

### 9.2 ACF By-Laws Part 2 Note c) under 14.5.8.5

**“that By-laws Part 2 under 14.5.8.5 have a new note c) inserted to read any British Shorthair which**

a) produces longhaired kittens or

b) DNA tests as a LH carrier

has the status (LHC) added after its registration number as happens with silver “(s)” or in some registries, colourpoint carrier “(cpc)”

**Judges Guild (SG)** did not support this as there is a DNA test for longhair and it should be up to the breeder to check.

**Cats NSW (DC)** agree in principle, but we need to educate breeders to ask for DNA tests.

**Lost:** 5 Yes (CANT., CAT, Cats NSW, GCCFSA, TFA) 6 No (Cats WA, COAWA, FCCQ, GCCFV, QFA, QICC)

**9.3 ACF By-laws Part 2. Clause 5 New Sub Clauses**

**“that ACF Bylaws Part 2. Section 5 Application for Registration be updated to include new sub clauses 5.13 & 5.14 responsibility of the breeder to transfer cat/kittens to new owner/s and provision of registration/pedigree”.**

New clauses to read:

**5.13** Breeders must transfer a cat/kitten into a new owner/s name/s and provide a copy of the registration/pedigree to the new owner in every instance. The pedigree may be endorsed (pet only, showing etc) by the breeder through the registrar upon transfer.

**5.14** In order that the registrar is enabled to keep accurate records at all times, it is the responsibility of any owner to ensure that details kept by the registrar are correct, including any desexing, change of ownership details etc.

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild did not have an opinion but stated if approved would have to be inserted before the currently numbered 5.13 & 5.14 and these renumbered accordingly.

**GCCFSA (FH)** would like to see a timeframe put on this, suggested within 3 months from the transfer to a new owner.

**QICC (JW)** were against the motion in that it should be up to the breeders to sign the transfer on the pedigree or certificate of registration.

A healthy debate on the pros and cons of the motion ensued.

**CANT. (SG)** as the seconder we have no objection for the 3-month timeframe being added to the motion.

**FCCQ (IJ)** Are happy to add the 3-month timeframe.

**Passed:** 8 Yes 3 No (Cats WA, GCCFV, QICC)

**9.4 ACF By-laws- Part 5 Awards - Amendment to 5.4.1(b)**

**“that ACF By-laws Part 5 Awards subclause 5.4.1(b), ACF Companion Award of Honour be awarded to the best neuter and spay companion in show”.**

**Moved:** GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins

**Seconded:** QFA, Janis Christison

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this.

**CAT (LM)** should have the word certificate at the end of the motion, the motion is talking about the issuing of the certificate not the actual award.

**Passed:** 8 Yes, 3 No (FCCQ, GCCFV, QICC)

**9.5 ACF By-laws Part 6.2 – Show Rules Amend Groups**

**“that By-laws 6.2 – National Show Rules have a new sub clause 32 b. added to rule 32 which reads: 32 b. Member bodies hosting an ACF (Inc.) National may elect to use Groups Longhair, Shorthair, and Companions**

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this.

**Passed:** 8 Yes 3 No (GCCFSA, GCCFV, QICC)

## 10 SUBMISSIONS - BY-LAWS PART 3 - BREED STANDARDS CHANGES

### 10.1 Bengal Standard - Recognition of Blue Colours & Patterns

**“that the ACF Inc recognise the blue colours/patterns in Bengal cats and allow championship status.**

**Moved:** GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins

**Seconded:** Cats NSW, Deb Nugent

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this. Also, there is a typo under head it should read Neck is long, substantial, muscular, in proportion to the head and body.

**CAT (LM)** believed that to recognise this was not in line with the original vision to develop a cat with a wild appearance. In addition, TICA did not recognise the blue, only GCCF and CFA did.

**GCCFSA (FH)**, stated that ACF took the TICA standard as the body of origin. The Breed was developed using SIA, BUR, DOM + Asian Leopold Cat. Blue is a natural product of the breed unlike the snow and pointed patterns. The blue colouration does not detract from the wild appearance. Cats in Australia producing blue all come from imported cats registered with TICA.

**FCCQ (IJ), GCCFSA (FH), QICC (JW)** all pointed out that the Bengal had already being recognised in pointed and sepia patterns so the argument “was not in line with the original vision of a cat with a wild appearance” can’t be sustained.

**Passed:** 7 Yes 4 No (CAT, Cats WA, COAWA, QFA)

### 10.2 British Shorthair Standard - Silver & Golden Tipped and Shaded Points

**“that ACF (Inc.) recognises silver and golden tipped and shaded points in British Shorthair.**

**Moved:** CAT, Lesley Morgan as amended.

**Seconded:** CANT, Julie Schuller

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this, with the addition of “point” in the motion and the amended eye colour to read “clear, bright, vivid blue, the deeper the better”.

**Passed:** 10 Yes 1 No (GCCFSA)

### 10.3 Mandalay Standard - Update

**“that the ACF Mandalay breed standard be updated to include:**

a) **Tabby Patterns**

b) **The following statement - The presence of a few white hairs may be overlooked in an otherwise excellent cat, but a noticeable number of white hairs, or a white patch, is a serious fault. A light sprinkling of white hairs is allowed over the shoulder, where damage may result from injections, or from other cats, as for breeding queens.**

**Moved:** Cats WA, Carole Galli

**Seconded:** Cats NSW, Deb Nugent

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild did not support this.

**Cats WA (CG)** advised that two Black Mandalay cats had been mated twice and each time produced the tabby pattern suggesting that black was masking the tabby pattern.

**CANT (JS)** stated that the agouti gene has to be expressed (be seen) in order for it to be passed on.

**Lost:** 2 Yes (Cats NSW, Cats WA) 9 No



#### 10.4 Siamese & Balinese Standard - Update

**Motion 1 - “that Bi-colour and Van colour descriptions be included in Siamese and Balinese; and aligned with Oriental Longhair and Oriental Shorthair.”**

**Moved:** GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins

**Seconded:** Cats NSW, Deb Nugent

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this.

**Passed:** 10 Yes 1 No (GCCFV)

**Motion 2 “that the Van description be added to the Siamese and Balinese colour and pattern standard.”**

**Moved:** GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins

**Seconded:** Cats NSW, Deb Nugent

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this, with the amended highlighted wording as follows:

‘The amount of white may be difficult to discern on kittens, and allowance should be made for this. As this is a predominantly white, point restricted cat, allowances must be made for lack of full expression of white colouration, point colouration and shading on the cat’s body until 18 months of age.’

**Passed:** 10 Yes 1 No (GCCFV)

**Motion 3 “that the Disqualify Faults for Siamese and Balinese be modified for White toe or toes to White toe or toes (except for colours with white).”**

**Moved:** GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins

**Seconded:** Cats NSW, Deb Nugent

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this.

**Passed:** 10 Yes 1 No (GCCFV)

#### 10.5 Sphynx Standard - Amendment to Profile Description

The current Sphynx profile description is “Slight to Moderate STOP at bridge of nose”.

FCCQ proposes that in line with the amendment by TICA in 2020 that the ACF Sphynx standard be amended to read:

“Slight to moderate change of direction at the bridge of the nose. Some degree of fuzz on bridge of nose.

**Moved:** FCCQ, Isobel Johnstone

**Seconded:** GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this and advised that “*to moderate*” was omitted in the ACF revised standard and should read “slight to moderate change of direction at the bridge of the nose”.

**QICC (JW)** queried why other changes in the TICA standard were not being considered? **FCCQ (IJ)** explained that the Sphynx breeders felt that the current wording sufficiently explained the requirements in those areas and were only looking at the most recent change.

**Passed:** 10 Yes 1 Abstain (QICC)

#### 10.6 Review of Breed Groupings

**“that ACF establish a sub committee to review the groupings of breeds (ACF Standards)**

**Moved:** Cats WA, Carole Galli

**Seconded:** FCCQ, Isobel Johnstone

**Judges Guild (SG)** the guild supported this, with two proposed members CAT, Lesley Morgan & GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins.

Meeting proposed that the sub-committee be chaired by Cats WA, Carole Galli, with GCCFSA, Fiona Hawkins and GCCFSA, Katherine Hill. After discussion, Carole Galli was nominated to contact those persons nominated to form the sub-committee of three (3).

**Passed:** 9 Yes 2 No (GCCFSA, GCCFV)

#### 11.1 ACF Legislation Policy – Nation Stakeholder in Matters Pertaining to Cats

1. proposes that the Australian Cat Federation Incorporated seek to become a Stakeholder Nationally in matters pertaining to cats”.
2. that The Australian Cat Federation Incorporated in the first instance write to Federal Ministers/Shadow Ministers for the Environment and other Political Parties espousing environmental platforms plus The Australian Veterinary Association and the RSPCA emphasising the role of ACF (Inc.) and its Member Bodies in responsible cat breeding via its Code of Ethics.
3. The ACF (Inc.)’s ongoing concern re the inhumane deaths due to the use of 1080 in the culling of feral cats despite the Threatened Species Commission’s undertaking in 2015 that only humane methods would be used.

**Passed:** 10 Yes 1 No (GCCFSA)

#### 11.2 Consultation Re Show Dates Within States/Territories

**“that in the case of states or territories where there is more than one ACF Inc. body, there will be transparent consultation and co-operation when member bodies are planning their show calendars. Ideally, it would involve a physical meeting and include CCCA member bodies’ dates.**

2020/2021 Year**

This past year has been quite busy with the following tasks:

- **By-Laws Part 2: Breeding and Registration Rules:** Updated with changes approved in 2020.
- **By-Laws Part 3: Breed Standards:** Updated with changes approved in 2020 along with several typo corrections found. Thank you to those who have provided feedback in this regard.
- **By-Laws Part 4: Judges Training Scheme:** Updated with changes from 2020.
- **Glossary of Terms:** A draft of this work in progress document is up for consideration. It is hoped that it, along with the benefit of having a single glossary will be supported.

Ongoing tasks identified:

- **Standard Corrections:** During the various Judges Training courses being conducted additional errors were reported.
  - Bengal Std - “nose” instead of “neck” under “head”.
  - Persian Std – “tail” which has the same description as the Exotic.
  - Turkish Van Std – “nose” which should have a dip.

The Bengal Std will be corrected regardless of whether the current proposal for the Bengal Breed is approved or not.

Due to an oversight the Persian and Turkish Van Std changes were not submitted for consideration at this ACF GM so will be submitted to the next meeting.

Another correction was identified in the Exotic Std where the points do not line up correctly with the parts of the cat. This will be picked up in the changes from approvals given at the ACF GM.

- **Conversion of Standards to ACF format:**

There was one standard remaining to convert (excluding colours/patterns) namely the Sphynx and that will be done in conjunction with the proposal for the Sphynx change at this meeting.

Work will now commence to review the colours and patterns across all standards to ensure they are correct in format and description. One item already identified is:

- Nose leather on agouti pattern cats in all breeds.

- **Zoom Meetings for Judge Training and Workshops:**

The Guild will continue to use Zoom to conduct reviews on subjects such as clarification of disqualification/withhold rules. Eye colour descriptions in certain breeds and other matters. It will continue to be used as a method of training cadet judges in the theory aspects of the JTS.

They existed for some 20 years prior to actual recognition of silver in tabby point SIA, for example.) Particularly in recent British imports, many cats have golden and pointed background.

Additionally, GCCF, WCF, and TICA (among others) all recognise these colours/patterns in British and several other breeds.

A light sprinkling of white hairs is allowed over the shoulder, where damage may result from injections, or from other cats, as for breeding queens.”.***

**Rationale**

The Mandalay was first developed in New Zealand. In Australia, the foundation cats differ in that British Shorthair x Burmese are used rather than Burmese x Domestic. The NZ standard recognises tabby and silver. Initially the breeders proposing recognition of the Australian Bombay as a Mandalay did not include Tabby or Silver in the standard. Now the breed is more established it is appropriate to include Tabby as this pattern can be carried down from the British Shorthair and does occur naturally. There is no proposal to include silver, currently as the inhibitor gene is not in the existing gene pool and no breeder are planning to breed silver.

Additionally. Advice received to use BSH Tabby pattern descriptions with the NZCF colour descriptions provided.

**BY-LAWS PART 3: BREED STANDARDS – SIAMESE/BALINESE – BI-COLOUR & VAN COLOUR DESCRIPTIONS**

***MOTION 1: Bicolour and Van colour descriptions be included in Siamese and Balinese; and aligned with Oriental Longhair and Oriental Shorthair.***

***MOTION 3: Disqualify Faults for Siamese and Balinese be modified for White toe or toes to “White toe or toes (except for colours with white).”***

***NOTE: to be voted on separately.***

**Rationale**

**MOTION 1**

As these four breeds have inter-mateability, there is the ability to produce Van colour patterns in Balinese and Siamese. Any Van coloured cats within these two breeds, currently are at a disadvantage, as they are shown and registered as Bi-colours. Therefore, this effectively produces an inaccurate pedigree, and these cats are at a disadvantage on the show bench against Bi-colours that meet the standard.

Additionally

Recommendation 1

Seeing as all colour standards for OSH, OLH, Siamese and Balinese, are originally based on FIFe colour standards. It is interesting to note that FIFe, typically allow up to 3 small patches of colour on the body, for the VAN pattern and therefore it would be in keeping with these standards to:

- a) Align ACF’s existing OLH and OSH standards with country of origin, and
- b) On acceptance of the changes to the Balinese and Siamese standards ensure they also align.  
Included are excerpts from the current Siamese, Balinese, OLH and OSH Standards.

**MOTION 2**

"VAN (add 01 after colour code) White cat with colour confined to the extremities: head, tail and legs. One or two small, coloured patches on body allowable. Note: Cats having more than two small body spots should be shown in the regular Bi-Colour class." And to include in the Notes, "The patches of white may be difficult to discern in a kitten, and allowance should be made for this. Since this is a point restricted cat, allowances must be made for lack of full expression of the piebald on the cat until 18 months of age since the white colouration matures with the point colouration of the cat, as does the shading on the body."

By adding these descriptions, would align the Siamese and Balinese Standards with the Oriental Longhair and Oriental Shorthair standards. Given that the expression of colour, or in the case of the white spotting gene, the lack of colour expression takes time to develop. There needs a note or disclaimer to acknowledge this. Expecting to see clear differences, between colour and white in a pointed van cat, similar to what would be seen in a pointed Bicolour, is not feasible, and even more so in an immature exhibit.

Additionally

Recommendation 2

A further recommendation, to consider, is that other registration bodies, overseas, also recognise Harlequin. Harlequin being a progression from Bicolour, to Van. It would be advantageous to consider including a colour descriptor for Harlequin across these Group 2 cats, to pre-empt any future appearances of the Harlequin pattern, and would further ensure integrity to the registration database.

**MOTION 3**

The current disqualify fault, means that all Bicolour Siamese and Balinese, should be disqualified, if the standard was correctly applied during judging at shows. If the previous remits (motions) are passed, then this effectively would also disqualify Van Siamese and Balinese.

The term “stop” is used to describe the profiles of breeds such as Bombay, Devon Rex, American Shorthair etc. all breeds which have far more drastic profiles.

It does not effectively describe the ideal profile of a Sphynx and tends towards a more extreme visual.

Amending the profile description will also help to provide a more universally understood visual for the breed and aligns with dissuading our breeds described Withhold All Awards, Any suggestion of Devon Rex or Cornish Rex in moult.

Additionally, the fuzz on the bridge of the nose is a unique expression of the Sphynx mutation and differentiates from other hairless/hair loss breeds such as the Donskoy, Peterbald and Lykoi, which all have rubbery bald noses (Donskoy & Peterbald in their hairless coat variety).

The groupings for ACF breed standards have Group 3 with far more breeds than any other group. With associations moving to all longhair and all shorthair for judging this is further exacerbated with groups 2 and 3 combined and group 1 standing alone. FIFe has reviewed and changed their groupings and ACF has followed FIFe standards.

Current recognition process is confused when it comes to deciding on the group for a new breed. Some member bodies believe that coat length is the criteria, and some believe body type is the criteria. Historically most new breeds seem to be added to Group three which is now very large with most breeds.

The Judges Training Scheme will be significantly impacted. It is likely that judges who are not all breeds may need education packages to learn new breeds.

## APPENDIX TWO

### GCCFV - ACF Virtual Show Report

The ACF Virtual show attracted entries from 64 exhibitors with 120 pedigree cats, 20 companions' cats and 27 rainbow bridge cats entered. The group 1 entry was 46 cats, group 2 26 cats and group 3 were 48 cats.

Entries were received from all affiliate bodies except for CAT, with the largest number from GCCFV with 19 exhibitors entering 41 cats, closely followed by QFA with 10 exhibitors and 27 cats, and GCCSA 7 exhibitors with 30 cats.

Entries were also received from members of outside bodies namely FCCV, FASA & Ancats.

We would like to particularly thank all the judges for giving up their time to judge the entries for us, and our sponsors.
